To provide a basis for improved management of Department of Defense (DoD) Maintenance programs through unique training for career professionals with top management potential.




DoD Maintenance Management by Civilian and Military Professional Logisticians

Program Overview

Selected nominees are assigned to the Materiel Readiness and Maintenance Policy (MR&MP) Office in the Office of the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Logistics and Materiel Readiness. Participants are required to perform duties as action or project officers for a variety of short- and long-term cross-Service tasks. These tasks include inputs to the Planning, Programming, Budgeting, and Execution System (PPBES); Congressional inquiries; out-year depot maintenance planning; Strategic Planning Guidance; and GAO audits and Inspector General reports. In addition, participants are involved in major projects and studies related to field-level activities, Integrated Logistics Support, Reliability-Centered Maintenance, Core Logistics, and joint-Service maintenance issues. Duties and tasks are generally designed to prepare participants for follow-on assignments with increased responsibility.

Participants can expect to travel to DoD field activities in order to obtain a broad perspective of DoD maintenance management systems and operational functions.



Nomination


In the spring of each year, the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Logistics and Materiel Readiness will request Military Services to nominate candidates for the Maintenance Management Fellowship Program (MMFP). The program lasts 12 months and normally begins in September.

Qualifications

Nominees should be civilians at the GS/GM 12-14 level or military officers at the 04/05 level. Nominees should have experience and training in logistics and be currently assigned to a maintenance or logistics career field with both staff and field experience.



Performance Appraisals

The Assistant Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Materiel Readiness and Maintenance Policy (ADUSD[MR&MP]) and the MMFP participants will develop a training agreement which establishes goals, objectives, and basic job assignments and projects for each participant. For civilians, job elements/performance standards and appraisals will be developed by the ADUSD(MR&MP) and the individual's parent organization. During the rating period, the ADUSD(MR&MP) and the parent organization will coordinate an appropriate appraisal based on job elements/performance standards and the individual's performance. For both military and civilian participants, the ADUSD(MR&MP) will write a training report to be forwarded through the appropriate Service for proper disposition.



Salary and Expenses

The Military Department responsible for the MMFP participant will provide a training manpower position and will be responsible for all funding to include temporary duty (TDY) performed in conjunction with the training assignment.
